

ABOUT NAAM FOUNDATION

A helping hand, for hands that feed the nation

Rapid degeneration of villages in the wake of droughts, increasing farmer suicides, and constant water crisis, has been a cause for concern in recent years. Nearly 82% of Maharashtra state falls within the rain-fed sector, while 52% of the area is drought-prone due to uncertain, insufficient and irregular rainfall. This adversely affects agriculture, leading to an increasing number of farmers committing suicide, year after year.

During the severe drought of 2015, the State of Maharashtra witnessed 3,000 farmer suicides. This was a very tragic moment, as the farmers had lost their crops, the only source of livelihood for themselves and their families, and were unable to repay their debts. Several women who had lost their husbands, were left with no support.

These tragic events and the agony of the farmers in the media, stirred Nana Patekar (Nanaji). This triggered him and his friend Makarand Anaspure to do something for the well-being of the farmer's families.

Thus 'Naam Foundation' was born.

In September 2015, Naam Foundation was formally established with the aim of helping the widows of farmers who committed suicide due to crop failure, and related reasons. Naam Foundation aims to facilitate development in deprived villages, and improve the quality of life for the people groups it supports.

A Transformational Shift

While the financial support provided to farmers gives them immediate relief and moral support, it is not a sustainable solution for dealing with their problem.

At the source of the issue is the water crisis, which if not dealt with, no permanent solution can be achieved. While insufficient and irregular rainfall is a reason for drought, it's not the only reason. Lack of a green cover, water conservation methods, imbalanced use of stored and ground water, cultivation of water intensive crops, silt deposition in dams, poor maintenance of existing canals and abandoned new projects, also contribute to the water crisis.

Naam Foundation initiated massive interventions in water conservation, to reduce the issue of water scarcity in the drought-hit villages of Maharashtra.

Naam Foundation is completely aligned with and contributing to the UN's sustainable development goals of 'No Hunger' and 'Clean Water and Sanitation' through various interventions.

PROGRESS UPDATES

Sept 2015 to March 2018

SUPPORT TO SUICIDE-AFFECTED FAMILIES

After the 2015 monsoon, over 34% of Maharashtra state has been drought-affected. The state consequently witnessed over 3,000 farmer suicides during the same year. Women were the most affected, and were left with no survival avenues.

SUPPORT TO FARMER'S WIDOWS

In Marathwada and Vidarbha, immediate relief of Rs. 15,000 was provided, while livelihood interventions were initiated. After procuring a list of suicide-affected families, Rs. 15,000 was given to each of the 2,394 farmer's widows as financial aid / temporary relief, from 23 districts across Vidarbha, Marathwada, Western Maharashtra and Khandesh regions.



WATER CONSERVATION

'Water is key to food security'. Ensuring its availability and proper use is crucial to reform the farming sector.

Naam Foundation has taken on the enormous challenge of water conservation across Maharashtra, by finding long-term solutions to mitigate the effects of droughts. Using heavy machinery, Naam Foundation has excavated and widened existing rivers and nalas to improve their storage capacities, which had hitherto reduced. This indirect method to increase groundwater and well water levels, has increased the capacity of the rivers and enhanced percolation; thereby recharging the groundwater table. Nearby villages now have sufficient water for irrigation, throughout the year.

MAJOR PROJECTS:

Pimpalner - Riddhi Siddhi River Project District : Beed.

Excavation of the Riddhi Siddhi river up to 34 kms was completed. The Govt. has acknowledged this work and built four small dams across the river after our work, benefitting 14 villages. Farmers now cultivate one crop every three months.

Katfal District : Solapur

The Kasalganga odha flows through the Katfal village, as the odha dried up Katfal experienced a drought, with villagers migrating towards cities. The village youth formed groups and began working towards water conservation. After completion of 1 km work funds ran out. Which stalled the work for 45 days. With the help of two Poclain excavators provided by Naam Foundation, the river was restored and all the wells and bore wells are recharged.

Loladgaon -Bindusara River Project District : Beed

To prevent rainwater flowing away, Naam Foundation first repaired the bandhara across the river. Excavation and widening of the river was also carried out, which helped irrigate an area of around 2000 hectares under cultivation. The percolated water also helps Beed, a distance of just 8 kms from Loladgaon.

Takarvan District: Beed

The 50-year old village dam was tremendously silted over the years, and around 500 wells / bore wells / hand pumps had ceased functioning. Post desilting operations by Naam Foundation in 2015-16, the village is now free from tankers, and the surrounding areas are also being irrigated.

Kalamb - Khateshwar Talav District: Yavatmal

The Khateshwar lake at Kalamb Taluka was built 60 years ago and wasn't desilted since. As a result, its storage capacity was completely exhausted and it began drying up in the months of January / February, along with the wells in the area. Since the intervention by Naam Foundation, the lake has not dried up for three years now, and 23 wells in its vicinity have also been recharged regularly.

Dharangaon-Borkheda Distrct: Jalgaon

Borkheda village is in the predominantly drought-prone region of Dharangaon, Jalgaon. Earlier, the villagers faced drinking water shortages; they are now cultivating multiple crops every year.















Aarvi

District: Beed

The land around the Uthla nadi was severely drought-prone. The 70 farm ponds built by Naam Foundation ensured that no more tankers were required. Village migration and suicides were also halted.



Kutubkheda

District : Aurangabad

Naam Foundation excavated and widened the river, rendering the village tanker-free. The surrounding areas were also brought under irrigation. Seeing these water conservation initiatives, Himalaya, an Ayurvedic product manufacturer approached the villagers for cultivation of Tulsi and other herbs.



Dighanchi- Manganga Project

District : Sangli

Before Naam Foundation intervened, the river bed had flattened out and was used as road. After the work began, 9 km of excavation work was completed and water became available. Boating has now started.

This project helped Atpadi and Sangola Talukas, in addition to parts of Solapur district.



Naam Canal: Atpadi

District : Sangli

Naam Foundation built a 15km canal which benefitted 20 villages of Atpadi Taluka, from the Tembhu Lift Irrigation Project on the Krishna river. The canal was named Naam-Atpadi Canal.



Kalamb-Sonkhas Talav

District: Yavatmal

De-siltation of the Sonkhas lake in Kalamb Taluka, has also resulted in an increase of water levels in the wells around the region. This project helps to provide protective irrigation and also completely resolve the water supply issue in two villages nearby.



Pusad -Pus Nadi

District: Yavatmal

The Pus river which flows through the city of Pusad, is the lifeblood of the city. It has been clogged in recent years due to accumulated debris and silt. To resolve this, the 'Pus River Rejuvenation Campaign' was initiated by Naam Foundation. Encouraged by the enthusiasm of the local people, Naam Foundation employed two Poclain excavators. The ambience of the river and surrounding region has completely changed, and water is now available throughout the year.

EDUCATION:



Shantivan School: This 10,000 sq. ft. residential school was built at Arvi, Beed, where 200 students of suicide-affected farmer families can avail of free education and accommodation.

Institutional Tie-ups: These were initiated with generous institutes like MGM College, Aurangabad and Gurukul Classes, where students can avail of free education for various courses like engineering, nursing, hotel management and IIT preparation. A total of 31 students have benefitted though these tie-ups.

School Accessory Distribution: Naam Foundation distributed school bags, uniforms and stationery for 250 students of Lingeshwaradarsh Vidyalay, Ahmednagar.

Cycle Distribution: Bicycles were provided to 454 girl students, who would otherwise have to walk 5 kms to school.

LIVELIHOOD:

Sewing Machine Distribution:
Young farmers between 18 and 30 years of age accounted for the second-highest number of suicides, leaving widows and children to cope with the consequences.

While an amount of Rs. 15,000 provides immediate relief, this gesture gives the families moral and psychological

To empower the widows of farmers who have committed suicide, 1,270 sewing machines were provided. Sewing machine clusters were also set up across 11 districts in Maharashtra.

OTHER INITIATIVES

Construction of Toilets

62 toilets were built at Gogalgaon village, Newasa Taluka, Ahmednagar.

Water Purifiers

Ten RO water purifiers were installed at Wathwada, Shivpur, Satala, Turk Pimpri, Taradgavhan, Tadsonna, Zhari, Gogalgaon, Nalavadewadi and Dhondalgaon villages.

Safe & Secure Shelter to Poor Families

Twelve houses were built for poor families in Latur, Beed, Ahmednagar, Aurangabad and Pune.

Soil Testing Machines

Four soil testing machines were provided at Wardha-Amla, Beed-Loladgaon, Parbhani-Zhari and Jalna-Jafrabad.

Tree Plantation

Naam has planted 62,500 tress at Ahmednagar, Aurangabad, Jalna and Nashik

Mass Marriages

Difficulty in repaying loans taken for their daughter's marriages, is a common reason for farmer suicides. In 2015 - 18, the marriages of 46 couples were supported in Maharashtra and Rs. 17 lakhs were given to the Charity Commissioner for mass marriages of farmer's daughters, in 17 districts of Marathwada and Vidarbha.

Dhanya Mahottsav

Dhanyamahottsav was an event organised from 1st may to 13th May 2017 in Thane district where 15 farmers from Hingoli, Nanded, Pune, Nashik and Beed participated. People directly bought foodgrains from farmers hence farmers made good profit by eliminating the middlemen and traders. In this event 15 farmers sold 24 tonnes of foodgrains.

Meal Camps

There was severe migration during drought due to lack of drinking water. Meal camps were arranged during this period where people got much needed meals twice a day from 15th may to 15th June 2016.

- 1. Kalewadi in Pimpri Chinchwad, Pune (1000 people)
- 2. Government Hospital, Beed (1000 people)

Diwali Sweet Distribution

Naam received a 9 tonnes of diwali sweets as donation from Smt. M R C High School Surat which are distributed to children at

- 1. Shantivan School, Beed
- 2. Infarm India (HIV), Pali
- 3. Seva Ashram, Shirur, Kasar
- 4. Ambedkar Pardhi Boys School, Beed
- 5. Anandvan Ashram, Chandrapur.

Medical Check-up Camps

Naam has arranged free medical checkup camps for 4062 where people were given free basic health check-up and medicines. These Medical camps were in collaboration with Sane Guruji Hospital and IMA Nanded. Each camp included 1 surgeon, 1 physician, gynaecologist, child specialist, eye specialist. Free Xray, ECG and blood testing was provided along with medicines for 15 days.

Drip Irrigation

Drip irrigation is the answer to places that experience a water scarcity all year round. This involves irrigating fields via controlled delivery of water to farms. As a pilot project, Naam has installed drip irrigation delivery systems in a few adjoining farms. The initiative was part of a community farming project, where villagers had to come together to cultivate a single crop. Not surprisingly, this tremendously increased crop yields. Today, Naam has installed drip irrigation systems in 150 farms (across an area of one acre per farmer) in Satara-Jakhangon, Jalna-Akoledev and Parbhani-Zhari.

Field Ploughing

Naam extended a helping hand to farmers who could not afford a tractor or a pair of bullocks to plough their farms, by carrying out this activity for them. This initiative has helped save the initial investment required to be done by the farmers. Naam has ploughed 85 farms (an area of 300 acres) in Nanded

Distribution of Medical Concession Cards

Farmers often tend to delay their medical treatment due to lack of money. To resolve this, verification of the economic condition of a farmer is done and a concession card is provided. This card enables poor farmers avail of discounted medical facilities. Naam has distributed 624 medical concession cards at Wardha and 97 concession cards at Aurangabad.

Village Development Initiatives

Naam has gone beyond, to conduct village initiatives on a regular basis. These include areas like: garbage management, construction of gyms, libraries and soak pits, tree plantation, village sanitation, water management and the development of agriculture.
