

River Rejuvenation

At NAAM Foundation, we recognize the critical role that water bodies play in sustaining life. That's why we have made it our mission to rejuvenate dying water bodies across Maharashtra. Our approach involves a team of engineers, geologists, technicians, and most importantly, the youth of the respective villages to identify the root cause of the problem and develop a plan to restore the water body.

One of the most effective methods we use to revive rivers is by removing the accumulated silt. Using heavy machinery, we excavate and widen existing rivers and streams to increase their storage capacity, which indirectly boosts the groundwater level and wells in the commanding area. As a result, we've increased the capacity and percolation of the rivers, effectively recharging the groundwater table.

Our efforts have resulted in surrounding villages having access to sufficient water for irrigation throughout the year, empowering farmers and improving agricultural outcomes. We've carried out projects such as de-siltation of lakes, excavation and widening of streams (known as odha in Marathi), river rejuvenation, construction of CCT and deep CCT, de-siltation of dams, and constructing artificial lakes in numerous districts of Maharashtra. At NAAM Foundation, we remain committed to continuing our efforts to restore and protect vital water bodies, ensuring a sustainable future for communities across the region.

River Rejuvenation-Major Projects

Shiv River, Chiplun, Ratnagiri

The Shiv River at Chiplun, Ratnagiri has been experiencing flood situations due to a decrease in its water-carrying capacity caused by excessive silt accumulation and encroachments in the city. To avoid recurring floods and potential economic and life losses, it was necessary to increase the carrying capacity of the river by removing the silt from the riverbed. The NAAM Foundation identified the problem and proposed a solution involving the provision of equipment and machinery, such as 5 poklane machines and 20 tipper dumpers, to clear up the river before the coming monsoon season. Efforts to increase the carrying capacity of the river proved to be crucial to control flood situations and prevent further damage. This was executed by NAAM Foundation with the help of local villagers.

Nandini River, Jamkhed, Ahemednagar

Ahmednagar district, located in the central part of Maharashtra, is the largest district in Maharashtra with a total geographical area of 17.41 lakh hectares The Karjat Jamkhed Integrated Development Foundation (KJIDF) has proposed to rejuvenate and restore the Nandani River, which flows through several drought-prone villages in Jamkhed Taluka. The Nandani River starts at an irrigation tank in Dhond Pargaon village and meets the Sina river at Jawala. It covers Chobhewadi, Munjewadi, and Rajewadi under its catchment area, and the total length of the river is 19.5 km, with a width of 40 meters.

Due to the accumulation of silt, the groundwater recharge rate of the Nandani river has declined over the years, leading to drought-like situations even in years with sufficient rainfall. The KJIDF proposed to desilt a stretch of 14 km with a width of 25 meters from the center up to a depth of 1.5 meters. As an immediate measure, KJIDF proposed to desilt approximately 5,25,000 m3 of silt, increasing the storage capacity of the river by 525 million liters of water.

The proposed project brought numerous benefits, including:

Increase in Storage Capacity: The desilting of the Nandani River increased the storage capacity of the river by 525 million liters of water, mitigated the situation of drought and provided a reliable source of water for the drought-prone villages.

Nutrient-rich Soil: The silt removed from the river helped villagers get nutrient-rich soil for their farms, which increased the productivity of their crops.

Awareness about Water Management: The project created awareness around water management and water budgeting, and prepared the villagers for a season of lesser rainfall with sufficient water at disposal.

Community Participation: Generating awareness about the water work being done is essential to improve people's participation in transportation of silt. Citizens of these villages will take the silt removed from Nandani river to their

respective farms. Awareness sessions will be conducted to inform citizens about the benefits of soil/ silt for farming that is being removed through rejuvenation.

The rejuvenation and restoration of the Nandani River was an excellent step towards mitigating the situation of drought in the area. The project increased the storage capacity of the river, provide nutrient-rich soil for farming, create awareness about water management, and encourage community participation.

Water conservation

"Except for the months of monsoon,, we never had enough water; the well that we made didn't have water either. NAAM Foundation, along with Epiroc company and Bhujal Abhiyan provided the machines to create an artificial pond while all of us collectively paid for the diesel. Four months later, we had a huge pond that stored more than 1.2 crore liters of water. We now have ample water, even in the month of March and April. An average of 50 quintals of corn per acre is now cultivated here. We thank NAAM Foundation for its support in making our village vibrant and bountiful."

With a steadfast focus on enhancing the water storage capacity and recharging the groundwater levels, NAAM Foundation has made significant strides in the area of sustainable water management. By adopting a holistic approach that incorporates cutting-edge technology and local community involvement, NAAM Foundation has emerged as a trailblazer in the field of water conservation.

One of the key objectives of NAAM Foundation is to enhance percolation so that villagers have access to sufficient water for farming throughout the year, even in scorching summers. Through its innovative and collaborative approach, the foundation has not only succeeded in augmenting the groundwater levels but also in educating and empowering the local populace to become self-reliant in water conservation. By leveraging the collective wisdom and experience of the villagers, NAAM Foundation has created a self-sustaining model that is both effective and scalable.

In the year 2021-22, NAAM Foundation has carried out water conservation activities in 124 villages from the districts of Jalgaon, Ratnagiri, Raigad, Ch. Sambhajinagar, Beed, Jalna, Latur, Ahemednagar, Pune, Sangli Satara, and Solapur of Maharashtra, impacting the lives of more than 8 lakh villagers. This remarkable feat is a testament to the organization's unwavering commitment

to the cause of sustainable water management. Through its tireless efforts, NAAM Foundation has transformed the lives of countless individuals and communities, providing them with a much-needed lifeline in the form of water. The impact of its work will be felt for generations to come, as it creates a ripple effect of positive change that will resonate far and wide.

124 villages and 8,10,495 lives benefitted through the water conservation efforts of NAAM Foundation.

Percolation Tank, Chalisgaon, Jalgaon

Percolation, the downward movement of water through soil under the influence of gravity, has become a vital solution to replenish groundwater. The percolated water travels deep into the soil, meeting the free water table, and recharges the depleted groundwater. In an effort to aid this natural process, organizations such as NAAM Foundation and its CSR partner, Epiroc, and Bhujal Abhiyan, have taken up the task of constructing percolation tanks across streams and gullies. Recently, the duo completed the construction of a percolation tank in Londhe, Chailgaon, to impound run-off water and aid in the recharge of groundwater. This initiative is expected to have a significant impact on the local community, and serves as a model for sustainable water management.

Water Management

The organization has been actively involved in various water conservation and management efforts across Maharashtra, a state in western India, for several years.

Some of the key water management initiatives undertaken by the NAAM Foundation include:

Watershed Development: The organization has implemented several watershed development projects in various parts of Maharashtra, which involve creating small dams, check dams, and other water harvesting structures. These structures help to increase the water table in the region, improve soil fertility, and prevent soil erosion.

Rainwater Harvesting: NAAM Foundation has encouraged rainwater harvesting as a means of conserving water. The organization has set up several rainwater harvesting structures in different parts of the state to help capture rainwater and recharge groundwater reserves.

Soak Pits

NAAM Foundation and the Zilla Parishad, Pune has collaborated to create soak pits for in the talukas of Ambegaon, Baramati, Bhor, Daund, Hevali, Indapaur, Junnar, Khed, Maval, Mulshi, Purandar, Shirur. The project has started on 31st March 2022 ans still continues. Collectively, these soak pits are of **13968** acres till date. The idea of collecting and reusing bath water and water used for cleaning utensils and clothes not only helps in conserving water but also plays a crucial role in increasing the groundwater table, which is a significant need in many areas. This initiative is an excellent example of how a simple solution can have a far-reaching impact on society and the environment.

Moreover, the soak pits also play a vital role in preventing the spread of mosquitoes and other pests, which can pose a significant threat to public health. By collecting and seeping the water into the soil, this initiative creates an environment that is hostile to the growth and reproduction of these harmful pests.

The NAAM Foundation and the Zilla Parishad's efforts to create soak pits are a testament to their commitment to promoting sustainable living and protecting the environment. It is heartening to see organizations and government bodies coming together to address such critical issues and make a positive difference in people's lives. This initiative is an inspiration to us all and serves as a reminder that even the smallest of actions can have a significant impact on our planet's well-being.

NAAM Foundation's efforts to support the widows and children of suicide-affected families have been significant in achieving its objectives. The comprehensive approach, which combines financial aid, skill-building, and emotional support, has helped create a sustainable framework for the affected families to rebuild their lives.

The NAAM Foundation's unwavering commitment to empowering and supporting the widows and children of suicide-affected families is a testament of the mission of a better, more equitable society. In this fiscal year, NAAM Foundation has helped numerous families in the districts of Akola, Amaravati, Ch. Sambhajinagar, Beed, Buldhana, Hingoli, Jalgaon, Jalna, Latur, NAgpur, Nanded, Parbhani, Solapur, Usmanabad, Washim, Wardha and Yavatmal. Through comprehensive training programs, the foundation has enabled the youth from such families to acquire skills that will help them gain meaningful employment & sustain their families. By teaching widows skills like sewing, the foundation has helped them become financially independent, allowing them to sustain themselves and their families with dignity and self-respect.

The foundation's support extends beyond just financial aid. It provides emotional support and counseling to the families affected by suicide, creating a sense of community and belonging that helps them cope with the trauma and grief. The NAAM Foundation's unwavering dedication for uplifting those affected by suicide reflects the deep commitment of creating a more compassionate and inclusive society.

Disaster Relief

Around twelve villages in the Morgiri and Koyna provinces were severely affected by the heavy rains during the last two weeks of July 2021. Several houses, roads, and narrow bridges were swept away by the landslides caused due to the rains, leading to huge losses. Numerous people lost not only their loved ones, but also their houses and livelihood. Transport and communication became non-existent as the crude pathways were flooded by the water. Flood relief was impossible. NAAM Foundation came to the rescue at the crucial moment and saved the people from further harm.

The Karad district of Maharashtra was struck by severe floods in the month of July 2021. Along with Morgiri and Mirgaon, the villages of Karate, Nanel, Kamargaon, Humarali, Navaja, Vanjhole, Vatavale, Dhikavake, Kusavade, Bharsakhale, Martahwadi were completely disconnected from the outer world due to the landslide. Mrs, Meena Salunkhe, a member of the Patan Gram Panchayat approached NAAM Foundation for help. The NGO responded immediately, sending 3 Prokleen machines, 6 JCBs, and 10 tractors. Mr. Ganesh Thorat and Mr. Vikramsingh Patil, the co-ordinators of NAAM Foundation and Swapnil Thorat, the representative of the Satara District, rose to the occasion and made quick work of cleaning the debris, which consisted of mud, stones, pebbles, boulders, and rocks along with the copious amount of garbage. They were successful in rebuilding roads and bridges to establish the communication within the area. The landslide occurred on 22nd July and the rescue team began their work on 30th July, organizing massive equipment, in heavy rains, in a mere week. Within a fortnight, the roads were ready, the streets restored, the bridges restored and the streets cleaned of waste. The foundation also provided emergency ration and first aid kits to more than 500 people in the area. Many lives were saved due to the speedy work done by the selfless workers of the NAAM Foundation. The villagers of the area were thankful for the quick response, detailed work, and careful consideration of the founders, Shri. Nana Patekar and Shri. Makarand Anaspure.







Ulka-The Spark of Development

The NAAM Foundation along with BioConcepts set up the Ulka Project for sustainable living to achieve the dual objective of forest management and localized income generation at Pachgaon. The additional aim was to empower women financially and train them for leadership roles. The small village of Pachgaon which comes under the buffer area of the Tadoba National Tiger Reserve was selected as a model to implement the project. The locally grown wild fruits such as Tendu and Kavath were used as a raw material for the nutraceutical products. A combination of traditional and modern techniques was used for food preservation. The project has proven to be a great way to supply the ever-increasing demand of health food in the market along with utilizing the potential resources and helping the local community.

The focus of the project was to give the local women a chance to be at the helm of the development. The women of the village were given substantial roles in the decision-making process, with Poorva Joshi, the cofounder of BioConcepts heading the investigating committee along with Mr. Ganesh Thorat from the Naam foundation. Women were a major part of the committee that called the shots in the project. Along with completing paperwork and getting quotations, women also completed a training in leadership skills and took the call with regard to deciding the required machinery, setting up the pre-treatment facility and chalking out the action plan for the project. The majority of the production line up is now made of working women supporting their families through the green collared job.

Another major factor has been formation of the bachat gat, a monthly savings group composed of women which often offer short term loans in times of need. The project has turned out to be a boon for the community, taking their small localized product on to a global market.







Project Pratapgadh: Helping 150 villages smile again

The NAAM Foundation has undertaken a disaster relief operation in 150 villages located at the foothills of Pratapgadh. The region was severely affected by the flooding of the Koyna, Solashi, Yerna and Kandati rivers, which caused debris from the hills to flow into farmlands, leading to the destruction of crops and rendering many farmlands useless by exposing the rockbed. The villagers rely heavily on farming for their livelihoods, and the disaster has left them with nothing. While media coverage primarily focused on the Malin village, NAAM Foundation stepped in to help the affected villages.

The foundation began by clearing the debris in the farmland, starting with Zhanjwad village in 2021-22. In addition to clearing debris, the foundation is training farmers to farm the top of surrounding hills where the farmland was completely destroyed. To provide alternative sources of livelihood, NAAM is helping the youth find jobs in various sectors such as hospitality, travel, and tourism. NAAM Foundation is involved in several arenas, including livelihood providing, vocational training, skill development for youth, women empowerment, and agriculture development.

NAAM is using poklanes to clear the debris blocking the farmland, and many villagers who were working in Mumbai pledged to donate half the amount required to run the poklanes. The rest of the amount will be collected by the villagers themselves. Impressed by NAAM's efforts, the current Chief Minister of Maharashtra, Mr. Eknath Shinde, donated Rs. 10 lakh for farmland cleaning from his own pocket. He praised NAAM for its efforts and acknowledged that the government was not able to reach the innermost villages, considering the enormity of the task.

The work is still ongoing, with around 40-50 villages yet to be helped. NAAM hopes to complete it in 2022-23. The foundation has set up an office in Bhima village to oversee the work in a better manner. For the next year, NAAM plans to adopt schools in the villages and develop them. Additionally, NAAM aims to redevelop the ladies' hostels and provide new sources of livelihood to the villagers to bring back the youth who moved to Mumbai to do menial jobs.

NAAM Foundation has also collaborated with CMAP, a governmental organization, to form a group of 15-20 farmers and teach them the process of

planting to harvesting geranium. Furthermore, NAAM has tested the soil of the region and discovered that it is suitable for cultivating turmeric and geranium. The percentage of curcumin is higher in turmeric if it is cultivated in this soil.

The NAAM Foundation's work at the foothills of Pratapgadh is still ongoing, and every single day of this war-level effort counts. The foundation hopes to complete the disaster relief operation this year. The ex-director of Reserve Bank of India, Yashvant Thorath, has joined the advisory board to oversee the work being conducted. Captain Asha Shinde, an advisor to NAAM Foundation, is educating the youth in these villages about various ways to join the army and police force. The current Chief Minister of Maharashtra, Ekhnath Shinde, has once again praised NAAM Foundation's work in these villages.

In conclusion, the NAAM Foundation's work in providing disaster relief in the foothills of Pratapgadh is making a significant impact on the lives of the villagers.

While there is still more work to be done, the foundation's efforts in clearing debris, providing alternative sources of livelihood, and collaborating with governmental organizations are commendable. The foundation's commitment to the region's development is evident through its plans to adopt schools, redevelop hostels, and provide new sources of livelihood to the villagers.









Helping the NDRF Heroes

In the wake of the devastating floods caused by the Shiv river in 2021, the National Disaster Response Force (NDRF) deployed soldiers to aid in the relief efforts for affected villagers. In a remarkable gesture of support, the NAAM Foundation stepped up to provide crucial aid to these soldiers. They supplied five state-of-the-art food vans, each equipped with a gas stove, refrigerator, and the capacity to cook for 40-50 people at one time.

This remarkable initiative proved to be a game-changer for the relief efforts, as the NDRF soldiers could now access hot, nutritious meals and were better equipped to aid the affected villagers. The food vans provided an essential lifeline for the soldiers, enabling them to work tirelessly towards providing much-needed assistance to the people affected by the floods.

The NAAM Foundation's proactive approach in the face of disaster highlights the importance of community support and collaboration during times of crisis. This timely intervention proved invaluable to the relief efforts, ensuring that the NDRF soldiers could carry out their vital work without any interruptions.

The initiative by the NAAM Foundation exemplifies the importance of social responsibility and collective action in making a meaningful impact in people's lives. It serves as a shining example of how a small gesture of kindness and generosity can make all the difference in times of need.

The work of National Disaster Response Force, India has been second to none. NDRF has rescued over 1.44 lakh precious human lives and also evacuated more than 7 lakh stranded persons from disaster situations within the country and abroad.

Considering their selfless efforts for humanity, NAAM Foundation made a small contribution of 5 fully customized Kitchen Vehicles for NDRF. The vans will serve as a fully-equipped kitchen setup when the teams are operating at disaster locations anywhere in the country.





Other Initiatives

1. Mass Marriages in Nashik

For years, the people of Maharashtra's tribal areas have struggled with the daunting expense of marrying off their daughters. Many of them cannot afford the lavish wedding ceremonies, leaving their daughters unmarried or even pregnant without any marital support. In such situations, they often resort to taking loans from landlords who, in turn, impose hefty taxes and make them work on their lands for free. The cycle of poverty and indebtedness only continues to worsen.

Since 2021, NAAM Foundation has been working tirelessly to alleviate the financial burden of these underprivileged families. The Foundation has organized Mass Marriage Drives in various regions of Maharashtra, including the tribal areas of Surgana, Nashik. The aim is to help families who are struggling to get their daughters married, by covering the cost of the wedding ceremony, including the wedding feast, the mangalsutras, and gifting utensils to the newlyweds to start their lives.

NAAM Foundation's efforts have already brought a smile to the faces of several couples. In 2021, 25 couples were married in a mass marriage ceremony. This number grew to 51 couples in 2022, and this year, the Foundation plans to marry 151 couples.

This is not the first time that NAAM Foundation has conducted Mass Marriage Drives in Maharashtra. In the past, the Foundation has helped families in Marathwada, where numerous farmer suicides had left families unable to marry their daughters.

NAAM Foundation's efforts have not only made a significant impact on the lives of these families, but have also inspired hope and happiness.





2. NAAM Gharkul, Chiplun

The small community living on the hill of town Nimbarwadi in the Chilplun Taluka of Ratnagiri was primarily made up of low-wage labourers. The quaint little town had almost nothing-very little water, heavy loadshedding, no health centre or school. The villagers had to brave the journey down the hill, in small carriages made of wood, with no motorable road. The children used to hike up and down from the hill to attend school. On 22nd July 2021, the Chiplun tehshil experienced torrential rains, cutting off the small hill town. Soon after, the landslides made the area inhabitable. The land cracked due to the landslides and houses became unstable. The wells closed up with the debris from the landslide, making water availability impossible. The townspeople then shifted to the nearby Ovali village and lived in the school premises for a while.

After a few months, the villagers decided to shift back to their homes, but the damage was too thorough to repair. The poor people, hardly making their ends meet, now became homeless. They could hardly afford to rent a room, nowhere to build the house. The NAAM Foundation decided to lend a hand and build houses for them. They built fully functional houses, equipped with running water and electricity. They made 12 houses in the Akali villages and 7 houses in the Ovali villages. The cost of 8-9 lakhs required for the construction was impossible for the villagers to raise. They are forever thankful to the NAAM Foundation, who built safe homes for the people of Nimbarwadi.
